The UK Risk Register:

- Provides an assessment of the most significant emergencies which the UK and its citizens could face over the next 5 years (National Risk Assessment remains classified)**
- Summarised into 3 categories: accidents, natural events (collectively known as hazards) and malicious attacks (known as threats).**
- Not the full range of possible risks to the UK, from the insignificant to the catastrophic. They are those risks that are deemed significant enough for inclusion due to their likelihood or impact or both**

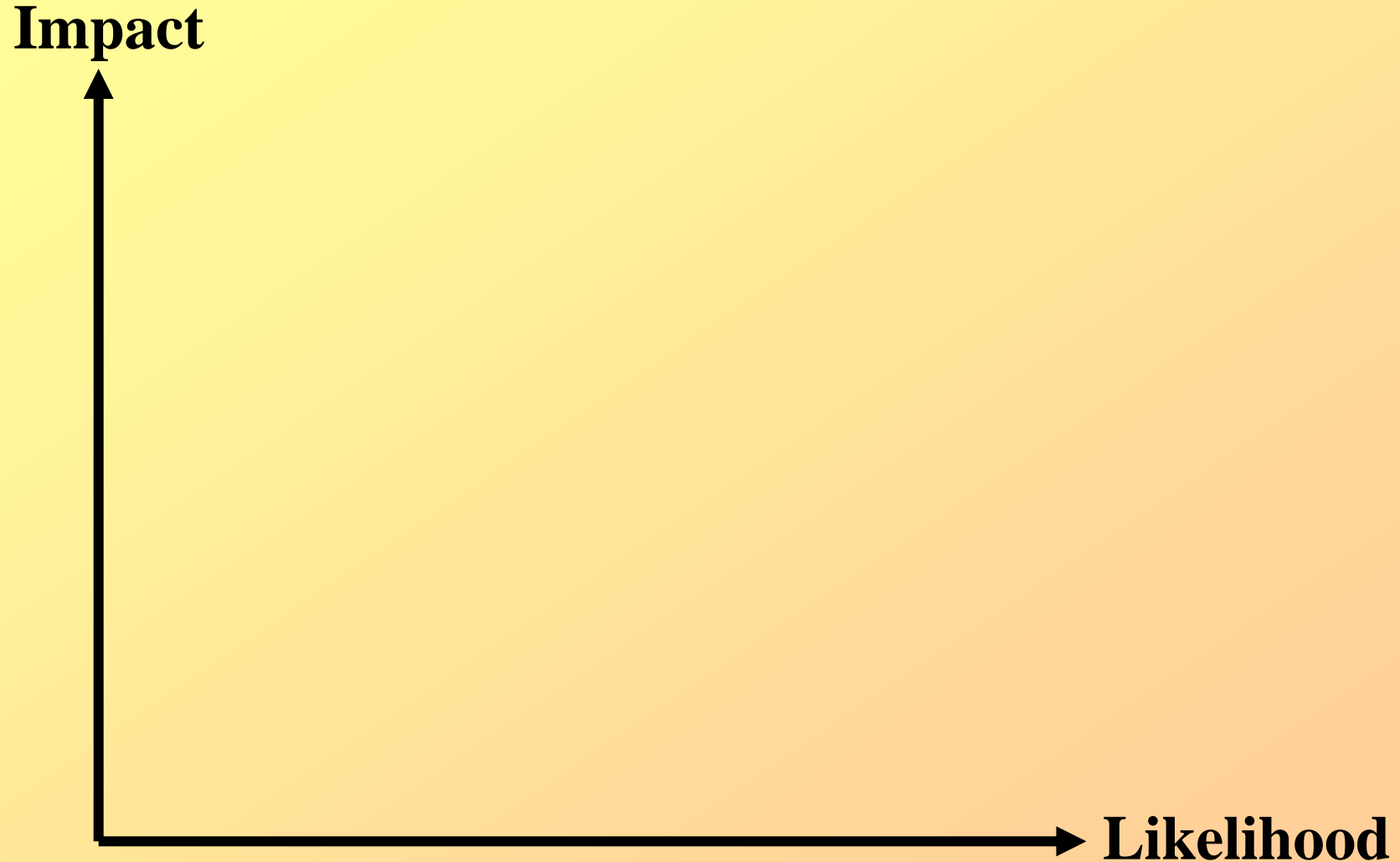
